CreationWise Tip by Deborah Carter



The average person in our country produces 4.9 pounds of trash every day,

which totals 292 million tons of trash every year nationwide. Half of our trash ends up in landfills, and one of the largest categories of waste material in our landfills is food (22%). Here are simple and powerful ways to reduce the amount of trash entering our landfills by reducing the amount of discarded food:

Reduce the amount of food you bring into your home. This step will have the most impact on the amount of food waste your home produces. If you don't bring it home, it doesn't become waste. Several tips to help get organized with this:

- Check your fridge, freezer, and pantry to help make your grocery list. Finish what you already have before you buy more.
- Stick to your list at the store. An entire industry has been created to get you to buy more than you need. Don't let them trick you; stick to your list!
- Plan your meals in advance so you can make the best use of shared ingredients.
- Keep track of what you're throwing away, so you can adjust your buying habits accordingly. For example, if you're always throwing out expired milk, buy smaller cartons of milk. Those bulk packages are not a better deal if the food expires before you can eat it.
- Stock the newest food in the back. Keep the oldest food in the front of your fridge or pantry to prevent it from expiring while hiding in the back.
- Store leftovers at eye-level, up front in the refrigerator, in clear or mostly see-through containers so that you SEE it and EAT it before it goes bad.

Keep the food waste that you do produce out of the landfill.

- Share food before it goes bad with neighbors, friends, or local food pantries.
- Make homemade broths out of bones, meat scraps, and leftover veggies.
- Compost! This will dramatically reduce your food waste, nurture your soil, and help the environment all at the same time. (e.g. compost at home with a worm bin, backyard compost pile, or tumbler, or drop off compost at the Wylde Center <u>https://www.wyldecenter.org/compost/</u>t).
